## Old Nipawin Bridge

*The 1908 foot span of the iconic old Nipawin Bridge rises high above the Saskatchewan River. Built in 1928 at a cost of \$1.5 million dollars, the crooked old bridge served to conquer the Saskatchewan River gorge and open all points beyond to trade and settlement. Prior to the bridge, early settlers crossed the river on a cable-guided Ferry which had only just replaced the more historic basket on a zip-line the year before.*

## Maurice Street Wildlife Sanctuary

*Only 17 KMs Away from the RCMP station at the junction of highways 35 and 55, travel 6km east (towards Carrot River) Turn left at Range Road 2140 North and follow for 11 km's. Watch for signs. Lined with trails carved from thick natural stands of untamed Boreal Forest, the Maurice Street Wildlife Sanctuary beckons bird, wildlife, nature lovers and hikers alike. Crowned a preserved sanctuary in 1968 by the Saskatchewan Natural History Society, the sanctuary is home to everything from black bears and cougars to raccoons and woodpeckers.*

*Bird Watching - Rare Flowers - There are over 245 identified species of birds living in the sanctuary including the Bald Eagle, Golden Eagle, the American Redstart, Pileated Woodpecker and the common Loon. There are also several species of flowers in the sanctuary including Large Yellow Lady's-Slippers and Ram's-head Lady's-Slippers.*

*Thick Boreal Forest - Tamarack, Balsam, Fir, White Spruce, Balsam Poplar and Aspen poplar line the hiking trails. Jack Pine is dominant on the sandy upland soil.*

*Beginning in 1911, black families from Oklahoma began moving to Canada in order to escape rampant racism and the poor quality of life resulting from their limited rights. around 300 moved into Amber Valley/Pine Creek area east of Athabasca, beginning in 1910. While a few were able to find abandoned land claims that improvements were already made upon, most needed two or more years to harvest their first crop.*

*By 1920, the average holding at Amber Valley consisted of thirty-eight acres (virtually all crops), three horses, two cattle, and houses and fence, totalling a value at \$400, which although was low, was deemed sufficient by the local authorities. Like their white counterparts, the Black farmers did not spend all their working hours in their fields. African Americans supplemented the family budgets by freighting, lumbering, and other jobs that were available seasonally in the area.*

## Chasm Provincial Park

*15 km south of 70 Mile House or 20 north of Clinton. A spectacular display of colour illustrates the park's rich geology in the Chasm Creek Valley and part of the Bonaparte River Valley. Successive lava flows form layers in varying tones of red, brown, yellow and purple, which have been revealed in the steep lava-layered canyon walls through erosion over the past 10 million years. Chasm Provincial Park protects the unique river canyon of the Chasm Creek Valley and part of the Bonaparte River Valley.*

## Clinton, BC

*Clinton was once a busy junction on the wagon road leading to the Cariboo and Barkerville gold fields. An historical cairn in Clinton marks the junction of two routes to the Cariboo gold mines; The original 1859 Cariboo Trail from Lillooet, and the Cariboo Road through the Fraser Canyon, built in 1863 by the Royal Engineers.*

### Clinton Museum

## Cache Creek, BC

### Lillooet Museum and Visitor Centre

*sits at the former location of a well-known Anglican Church, and houses artifacts and relics from the Gold Rush era, as well as a re-creation of Ma Murray's old news office.*

*a stately home built in the 1890s era by the Gold Commissioner Caspar Phair. In the 1940s it became the residence of Dr. Masajiro Miyazaki, a distinguished leader of the Japanese-Canadian Community, and one of two Lillooet residents named to the order of Canada (Margret 'Ma' Murray being the other).*

## Ashcroft, BC

### Ashcroft Museum

### Lytton Chinese History Museum

*Houses the largest collection of historical Chinese artifacts in Canada with the goal of encouraging a greater interest in, and understanding of, the experiences, hardships, and contributions made in BC's Interior by thousands of Chinese miners, railway workers, merchants and farmers*

### Lytton Museum & Archives

*In spite of its small size, Lytton has played a significant role in B.C.'s history. Its location at the confluence of the Fraser and Thompson Rivers made it an important location for First Nations people for food gathering and for explorers finding their way to the west coast. As it grew, it became a provisioning point for miners following the lure of the gold rush and the railways connecting our country east to west.*

### Hell's Gate Air Tram

*Driving the scenic Fraser Canyon with its 7 mountain tunnels into the historic heart of British Columbia you come upon a strange and wondrous sight: 750 million litres of water travelling through a 33 metre wide passage. This is Hell's Gate, so named after Simon Fraser's comments during his search for a better fur trade route. Hell's Gate is poised on the Gold Rush Trail, and it contains one of the only descending gondolas in North America. These aerial trams that cover a 152 metre descent give you a bird's eye view of one of the most treacherous passages on the Fraser River.*

## Yale, BC

### Yale Historic Site

*Yale, B.C. was once the largest city north of San Francisco and west of Chicago. Originally established in 1848 as a Hudson's Bay Company trading post, Yale grew with the influx of an estimated 30,000 gold miners during the gold rush of 1858. In the 1860's, with the construction of the Cariboo Wagon Road, Yale became the main terminal for one of the largest sternwheeler routes in North America. The 1880's saw the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway, with construction headquarters housed in Yale.*

### St. John the Divine 1863

*St John the Divine church was built in 1863 in an attempt to 'civilize the miners'. A major restoration project was undertaken in 1953 and another smaller one in 2001. The original walls, rafters and handmade nails are still clearly visible but sadly all that remains of the original rectory beside the church is its stone foundation. Exhibits within the church include original altar pieces from the 1860's as*

*well as "Enduring Threads", a collection of antique linens, many hand stitched by the students off 'All Hallows in the West' girls school.*

## Gold Panning at Yale

*Feel first hand, the thrill of hunting for gold. Transcend time and experience the full range of emotions that thousands of men faced on a daily basis a hundred and fifty years ago. A friendly, costumed interpreter explains the history, shares stories and gives you a lesson in the art of gold panning. Take a self guided tour of the historic town of Yale with a walking guide book, available for free in the museum gift store. Guided walking tours are available for groups of 10 or more by advance booking.*
